

Canadian First Nations International Guest Speakers in Aotearoa New Zealand

Alcohol Healthwatch is very pleased to be able to bring to Aotearoa New Zealand, Jenelle & Jordan McMillan. Jenelle is a community educator and counsellor from Canada who specialises in the topic of Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD). During her 2009 visit, Jenelle will share her extensive knowledge and experience of FASD from the perspective of an educator skilled in the teachings of Canadian First Nations, and her personal journey as a birth mother of a son born affected by prenatal alcohol exposure. Jenelle's son Jordan, now 18 years of age, will also be presenting on his experience of living with a FASD.
